**Rick Wyman** 

**Richard E. Wyman** is the former Assistant Director of the United States Coast Guard Band, where he regularly conducted throughout the United States and abroad in concert tours of Japan and Taiwan, and led the Band's educational initiatives. He also served as the Band's producer for ten CDs and two White House Pageant of Peace PBS specials.

Dr. Wyman is currently the Executive Director of the Community Music School in Centerbrook, CT and Music Director of the MetWinds (Metropolitan Wind Symphony) of Boston. He enjoys working with musicians of all ages, regularly appearing as clinician

and guest conductor with a variety of school and honor festival ensembles. Wyman's work as a saxophonist earned two year-long residency grants from the National Endowment for the Arts, four performance visits to the White House, an appearance on The Tonight Show with Jay Leno and employment at Disneyworld and Busch Gardens (FL). He holds degrees from the University of Connecticut, University of Illinois, and Eastman School of Music.

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# **About the Assistant Conductor**



Mark Olson, Director of Harvard Band and Wind Ensemble, conducts the Harvard Wind Ensemble, serves as an advisor to the Harvard University Band and administrates all aspects of the band program at Harvard. Under his direction, the Harvard Wind Ensemble has commissioned and premiered works by Libby Larsen, Tania León, and David Amram.

Mark also is the Director of the Middlesex Concert Band and the New England Brass Band. Olson received degrees from Concordia College in Moorhead, MN and the University of Minnesota.

An active trumpet performer and soloist, he plays trumpet in the MetWinds, The Tarnished Brass and has been a member of the New Sousa Band as well as the symphony orchestras in Austin and Rochester Minnesota.

# About the **Soloists**



Joe McCarthy Percussion

**Joe McCarthy** has led a diverse career as a drummer/percussionist, bandleader, producer, and educator in a myriad of settings from symphony orchestra to bebop, big band, Afro-Cuban, theater and beyond.

Joe is the founder, leader, producer, and drummer of The New York Afro Bop Alliance Big Band (NYABABB), winner of the 2008 Latin Grammy® for Latin Jazz Album of the Year and nominated in the same category for the 51st Grammy Awards® for the Heads-Up release "Afro Bop Alliance", featuring Dave Samuels. NYABABB has released its eighth recording, "The Pan American Nutcracker Suite",

on Joe's independent label Angelface Records, which received a 2023 Latin Grammy® nomination in the "Best Arrangement" category.

Active in education, Joe has held adjunct appointments at the collegiate level since 1992 upon graduating from the University of North Texas with a Masters in Percussion Performance. Previous adjunct positions include Texas Wesleyan, Georgetown, and George Mason University. Joe is currently an adjunct Professor of Music at the University of New Haven.

As a clinician, Joe has been a featured performer and clinician at the Percussive Arts Society International Convention (PASIC), Jazz Educators Network International Convention (JEN), and has presented masterclasses around the world covering a wide range of topics from drum set/percussion performance to music business management, and development of essential tools for a life in music.

As an author, Joe is published by Alfred music with "Joe McCarthy's Afro Cuban Big Band Play-Along Series", featuring a book/CD play-along and Vol's I & II DVD's. This series has received rave reviews worldwide and is part of the curriculum at The University of North Texas, University of Miami, Berklee School of Music, Humber College and among others.

In 2020, Joe released his new all-inclusive, online drum set system titled "Basic Training", built upon the five foundational components essential to achieving total control of the drum set including Balance, Alignment, Substitution, Interdependence, and Control. Joe is a twenty-year veteran of The United States Naval Academy Band, where he served as Chief Petty Officer, principal percussionist with the wind ensemble, and Chief in Charge/drummer of the Next Wave Jazz Ensemble- one of the Navy's two premier big bands. Under Joe's direction, the Next Wave commissioned and recorded new works by Jim McNeely, Vince Norman, Dave Samuels, Shawn Purcell, and Dan Cavanagh.

# About the **Soloists**



Nick Marchione Trumpet

**Nick Marchione** was born and raised in the rich music town of Philadelphia. His father, Tony Marchione was a renowned teacher and trumpet player who coached greats like Randy Brecker and Lee Morgan. His father may have taught him to play, but he certainly didn't let him off easy. Marchione wasn't allowed to touch the trumpet until he could solfegge in every clef.

In 1999, Marchione moved to NYC to attend Mannes College of music where he studied with Vince Penzarella. At age 20, Marchione took a job as the trumpet player for a show called "The Producers", which broke a record winning the most Tony Awards for a single

show. He has gone on to play in many, many Broadway shows since, including Disney's "The Little Mermaid," Memphis," How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying" (starring Daniel Radcliffe), "Porgy and Bess" and "Bandstand".

Playing on Broadway is just one of the many genres to which Marchione has lent his trumpet expertise. He has also played with many pop and rock groups, most notably, touring with the famous Blood, Sweat & Tears from 2002-2006 and with Prince from 2012-2016.

Marchione is perhaps best known for his work as a jazz lead trumpet player. In 2001 he joined the Carnegie Hall Jazz Band under the direction of Jon Faddis. After subbing with the Vanguard Jazz Orchestra since 2000, Marchione was awarded the lead trumpet position in the group in 2005. He was also a founding member and lead trumpet player of the Birdland Big Band.

Most recently Marchione can be heard on the FX television limited series Fosse/Verdon and playing lead trumpet and arranging on the Latin Grammy® award winning The New York Afro Bop Alliance Big Band's latest recordings.


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# MetWinds **Music Funds**



The **Metropolitan Wind Symphony Commissioning Fund** is an endowment that provides the financial means for MetWinds to commission new works to be composed for concert band. More than 25 new works have been contributed to the concert band repertoire by MetWinds due in large part to this endowment. This includes compositions by internationally renowned composers including James Curnow, Johan de Meij, Elliot Del Borgo, Peter Schickele, Guy Woolfenden, Chen Yi, Lewis Buckley, Frank Ticheli, and Julie Giroux.

The **Roy L. and Lauren J. Komack Music Memorial Fund** was established due to the generosity of 58 individuals and families who donated to MetWinds in Roy and Lauren's memory. Both Roy and Lauren loved performing and listening to original band music. Contributions to this fund insure we have the resources to acquire original band works. With the passing of Lauren in 2017, she bequeathed a generous additional gift to the MetWinds to provide ongoing financial support for the organization.

# About **MetWinds**

The Metropolitan Wind Symphony was founded by Jerry Gardner in 1971 and was awarded the prestigious 2015 Sudler Silver Scroll Award for Community Concert Bands by the John Philip Sousa Foundation. Currently celebrating its 54th season, MetWinds comprise over 60 talented woodwind, brass, and percussion instrumentalists who audition for membership and seating. The organization makes a significant contribution to the cultural life of the Greater Boston community by providing its audiences with high quality concerts and its members with opportunities for musical growth.

MetWinds presents formal performances of traditional and contemporary wind band literature, as well as more informal pops concerts throughout the metropolitan Boston area. Members rehearse Wednesdays from September through June, traveling from more than 30 communities in Massachusetts and neighboring states. Consisting of volunteers, members pursue a wide variety of careers including education, engineering, computer science, medicine, law, music, and public health.

The Metropolitan Wind Symphony Commissioning Fund, begun through an anonymous endowment, allows MetWinds to actively contribute to the wind band literature by annually commissioning new works. Our commissioning program has included four categories of composers. These include internationally-known composers James Curnow, Johan de Meij, Elliot Del Borgo, Peter Schickele, Guy Woolfenden, Chen Yi, Lewis Buckley, Frank Ticheli, and Julie Giroux. Massachusetts composers include Allen Feinstein, Peter Hazzard, Marjorie Merryman, and Greg Tucker. Emerging composers include David Dzubay, John Heins, and Greg Sanders. The first student composers commissioned by MetWinds were Hayato Hirose, Noah Taylor, and Jesse Brault, whose pieces premiered in 2005 and 2007, followed by Matthew LaRocca and Joseph Kaz in 2013.

In 2010 and 2011, MetWinds premiered fanfares by John Heins, Kevin Wilt, Joseph Eidson, and Alexandra Conza, winners of our 40th Season Fanfare Competition. Many of these works have been published and have been performed in the United States and abroad by other wind ensembles.

The Boston Festival of Bands, founded by MetWinds in 1989, includes bands from New England, the Mid-Atlantic states, and Canada. The Festival is celebrated annually at the historic Faneuil Hall in Boston on the second Saturday in June. The Continuum series, also founded by MetWinds, involves middle school, high school, and New England college bands in educational interaction and outreach. The latest Continuum was hosted by MIT at Kresge Auditorium in Cambridge in March, 2016. Besides the Metropolitan Wind Symphony, the concert featured the MIT Wind Ensemble and the Foxboro High School Wind Ensemble.

In April 2005 at the invitation of the New England College Band Association, MetWinds performed at their Gordon College conference. MetWinds is a member of the Association of Concert Bands (ACB), the national organization for concert bands, and has been selected three times to perform at the ACB National Convention: April 1994 in Burlington, VT, April 2012 in Poughkeepsie, NY and April 2019 in Woodcliff Lake, NJ.

This music will make you want to dance! Virtuosity will be on display in this concert inspired by a wide spectrum of dance styles. Warren Benson's beautiful band classic *The Solitary Dancer* contrasts nicely with Florence Price's rhythmic *Juba Dance*. The jazz-influenced *Jubilo* was written by Wynton Marsalis for the New York City Ballet in 1993. Scott McAllister's *Krump* emulates the energy and passion of the dance style that evolved in the early 2000's among teens in Los Angeles neighborhoods such as Compton, South Central and Watts. The afternoon concludes with an authentic transcription of Massenet's beloved ballet suite *Le Cid*, with its dances from different regions of Spain.

**Mark Watters** (b. 1955) trans. Mark Watters & Ira Hearshen *Forged in Fire* (1996) [4 min]

Forged in Fire is a tribute to search and rescue teams around the country that risk their lives to keep us safe.

The American composer, Mark Watters, is a six-time Emmy Award-winning composer and conductor whose diverse career spans 400 television episodes, feature films, DVDs and video games. He has served several terms as Music Governor on the Television Academy's Board of Governors and is in his third year as Co-Chair of the Academy's Creative Arts Emmy Awards Committee. Mark holds the distinction of serving as Music Director for two Olympics: the 1996 Centennial Games in Atlanta, and the 2002 Salt Lake City Winter Olympics.

Recent projects include serving as Music Director for the highly acclaimed animated series, *Have A Laugh*, a three-year project to restore and re-record 60 classic Disney shorts from the '30s and '40s. 2012 marked his debut with Pixar Animation Studios, with his original score for *Time Travel Mater* and serving as principal arranger for *Pixar In Concert*, which has enjoyed numerous performances around the world. Most recently, he scored the 2013 Oscar-nominated short, *Get A Horse*, which appeared in theaters with the blockbuster *Frozen*.

In 2017, Watters took a full-time position at the famed Eastman School of Music as head of their newly formed *Contemporary Media and Film Scoring* graduate program. He also is the director of the Beal Institute for Film Music and Contemporary Media, named after Eastman alum and Emmy Award-winning composer, Jeff Beal.

#### Norman Dello Joio (1913-2008)

Variants on a Mediaeval Tune (1963) [11 min]

The tune, *in dulci jubilo*, has been used by numerous composers, including Johann Sebastian Bach, as subject matter for a variety of musical works. The composer was inspired by this melody to compose a set of variations. They consist of a brief introduction and theme, followed by five "variants" which send the mediaeval melody through five true metamorphoses, strongly contrasting in tempo and character, and utilizing the possibilities of the band to the highest degree.

*Variants on a Mediaeval Tune* was commissioned by the Mary Duke Biddle Foundation for the Duke University Band, Paul Bryan, conductor. It was first performed on April 10, 1963.

Norman Dello Joio began his musical career as organist and choir director at the Star of the Sea Church on City Island in New York at age 14. His father was an organist, pianist, and vocal coach, coaching many opera stars from the Metropolitan Opera. He taught Norman piano starting at the age of four. In his teens, Norman began studying organ with his godfather, Pietro Yon, who was the organist at Saint Patrick's Cathedral. In 1939, he received a scholarship to the Juilliard School of Music, where he studied composition with Bernard Wagenaar.

As a graduate student at Juilliard he arrived at the conclusion that he did not want to spend his life in a church choir loft, and composition began to become his primary musical interest. In 1941, he began studies with Paul Hindemith, the man who profoundly influenced his compositional style.

A prolific composer, the partial list of Dello Joio's compositions include over forty-five choral works, close to thirty works for orchestra and ten for band, approximately twenty-five pieces for solo voice, twenty chamber works, concertos for piano, flute, harp, a concertante for clarinet, and a concertino for harmonica. He has also written a number of pedagogical pieces for both two and four hands.

Dello Joio taught at Sarah Lawrence College, the Mannes College of Music, and was Professor of Music and Dean of the Fine and Applied Arts School of Boston University. From 1959 until 1973, he directed the Ford Foundation's Contemporary Music Project, which placed young composers in high schools who were salaried to compose music for school ensembles and programs. The project placed about ninety composers, many who successfully continued their careers.

# **Jeff Tyzik** (b. 1951) *Riffs* (2009) [9 min]

*Riffs* is a one movement composition in three sections which include a fast swing, a heavy medium swing and an Afro Cuban finale that turns the wind ensemble into a huge jazz ensemble with the jazz drum soloist leading the way.

The American composer, Jeff Tyzik, earned his Bachelor of Music and Master of Music degrees from the Eastman School of Music. While at Eastman, Tyzik met Chuck Mangione, a flugelhornist from Rochester, who was teaching at the school. He worked with Mangione between 1973 and 1980 as lead trumpeter in Mangione's band and as co-producer of four albums. During this time, Tyzik also began a long collaboration with Doc Severinsen, when Severinsen brought him to London to work on two albums with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra.

In 1983 the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra approached Tyzik and Allen Vizzutti (a friend of Tyzik's from Eastman) about creating a pops program for the orchestra. The pair spent the next decade working with orchestras around the country on similar programs.

In 1994, Tyzik was named Principal Pops Conductor of the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra, a position he still holds. Since then, he has established himself as one of the country's preeminent Pops conductors and arrangers, acting as Principal Pops Conductor for the RPO, the Dallas Symphony, Oregon Symphony, Vancouver Symphony Orchestra, The Florida Orchestra, Detroit Symphony Orchestra, and the Seattle Symphony.

Tyzik's original compositions for Wind Ensemble, including *Riffs*, have been recorded by the Eastman Wind Ensemble.

# **George Frideric Handel** (1685-1759) ed. Mark Hindsley Music for The Royal Fireworks (1749, 1979) [13 min]

The Music for the Royal Fireworks is a suite for wind instruments and percussion composed by George Frideric Handel in 1749. King George II of Great Britain commissioned the work to accompany fireworks in London's Green Park on 27 April 1749. The music celebrates the end of the War of the Austrian Succession and the signing of the Treaty of Aix-la-Chapelle (Aachen) in 1748. The work was very popular when first performed and following Handel's death.

The work was composed by request of the King for martial instruments (winds and percussion) only with "no fiddles." The original work was scored for 16 oboes, 16 bassoons, fifes, flutes, 40 natural trumpets, 2 natural horns, serpents, 8 pairs of kettledrums, 101 cannons, and 18 pieces of ordnance. Also, side drums (snare drums) were to play *ad libitum*.

A contemporary of Bach, Handel was born in the city of Halle in the Duchy of Magdeburg, then part of Brandenburg-Prussia. Handel was trained in Halle and served as organist at the Calvinist Cathedral of Halle (even though Handel was a Lutheran). In 1710, Handel visited England, which was to lead to his eventual residency and his most prolific compositional period.

# **Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky** (1840-1893) arr. Vince Norman & Joe McCarthy The Pan American Nutcracker Suite (2021, 2024) [19 min]

The Pan American Nutcracker Suite is a global musical adventure that celebrates and unites Tchaikovsky's timeless masterpiece *The Nutcracker Suite*, with the beautifully diverse musical traditions of the Americas and beyond! It was commissioned by University Texas at Arlington Jazz Ensembles, Tim Ishil, Director.

Originally written for Joe McCarthy's New York Afro Bop Alliance Big Band, this reimaging of the big band work expands the color pallet of the big band to a larger wind ensemble. This afternoon's performance is the world premiere of the wind ensemble version.
